As the COVID-19 situation is rapidly changing, the Allegheny County Department of Human Services (DHS) is working with providers to help identify the needs of the people we serve.

Health update

- Stay-at-home ordered for Allegheny County effective 8pm tonight
 - This order emphasizes that individuals in the county, to the extent possible, should stay at home and distance themselves from others.
 - There is <u>no change</u> to the life-sustaining businesses and waivers that have previously been in place, or to the requirements for restaurants to limit their operations to take-out and delivery.
 - All non life-sustaining businesses remain closed <u>businesses</u> defined here

Health update


- In Allegheny County: 48 confirmed cases; 1 death (source)
- In Pennsylvania: 644 confirmed cases; 75 in Western PA (source)
 - 4 deaths so far (source)
- In United States: 33,018 confirmed cases and growing; 428 deaths (source).

Policy & legislative updates

- Congressional negotiations in full swing for "Phase 3" legislation. Deal expected at some point this week.
- US Department of Health and Human Services HHS Office for Civil Rights continues to issue guidance on telehealth remote communications
 - FAQs on remote communications found <u>here</u>.
 - Press release found <u>here</u>.
 - Notification of Enforcement Discretion found <u>here</u>.
- Census planned visits to households pushed back to start May 28th instead of earlier in May.
- PA legislators in talks to postpone State Primary until June 2nd with flexibilities possible for absentee ballots, polling locations.

Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency (PEMA) Reporting

DHS Food Distribution Map

- Still working to incorporate food bank sites (food bank is collecting survey responses from partners with updated distribution information)
- Community can directly submit sites and comment if a listed site is closed
- Includes information about which sites want/need volunteers

Women, Infants & Children (WIC)

- The WIC program is moving to a modified operating schedule through March 30, 2020. The following WIC office locations will be open Monday-Friday, 8 a.m. – 3 p.m.:
 - McKeesport
 - Mt. Oliver
 - Wilkinsburg
 - Downtown Pittsburgh
- The Springdale WIC office will be open for benefit pickup Thursdays and Fridays from 8 a.m. 3 p.m. through March 30, 2020.

If you are coming to an appointment, please:

- Contact WIC staff ahead of time to schedule your benefit pick up
- Leave your children at home to reduce their risk of exposure
- Stay at home if you are feeling sick.

A proxy may be added over the phone to pick up benefits. All other WIC offices will be closed during this time; however, WIC staff will be able to provide consultation over the phone.

AAA: Food Updates for Seniors

- Kosher "Grab and Go" meals are being provided by the JCC to known consumers.
 - Schedule: Mondays and Wednesday's 11am-2pm. Drive through pick-up at the JCC.
- All HDM meals and "Grab and Go" meals (except for kosher meals) are frozen meals.
- Two of our larger food providers indicated that they have the capacity to increase meal production should the need arise.

AAA: OPTIONS In-Home Services

- Considered essential and "life-sustaining" so this service program continues to operate
 - Providers are using their COOP and/or Emergency Preparedness Plans as needed
- AAA and Options Providers:
 - Prior to a face to face visit are screening for COVID-19 with an approved tool.
 - Identifying our most vulnerable consumers by case complexity and frailty. If there is a future restriction of service, these high-risk individuals would continue with personal care services.
 - Important to note: The network is presently serving all consumers for personal care.
 - Home Support, except for grocery shopping, may be modified or stopped by provider request, with AAA approval. (Home support = light housekeeping, etc.)

Isolation/Quarantine locations:

- Center of Life Homewood
 - 33 units (single room occupancy)
 - Will be ready by end of this week
 - Population: homeless persons currently in shelter or on streets who are vulnerable due to age and underlying health issues, but not in need of complete isolation due to sickness
 - Persons will be referred in coordination with DHS and shelter/outreach providers
 - Will be staffed by CHS
- Hays School Building Mt. Oliver
 - Population: families across DHS (homeless, CYF, etc.)
 - Will be staffed by Auberle
- Hotels
 - 130-220 units
 - Hope to come online sometime next week
 - Population: persons across DHS systems who need to be isolated (persons who are sick or especially vulnerable and need complete isolation)
 - Will be staffed by Pittsburgh Mercy

Behavioral Health: Residential

- Visitation:
 - Currently prohibited from all state center and state hospital campuses, youth development centers and youth forestry camps
 - Exceptions to policy are in place for visits of medical necessity, legal counsel, probation or family and clergy visits as approved by the facility director. All visitors will be screened for health reasons upon arrival
- OMHSAS (Office for Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services) is currently finalizing guidance for RTF and other residential providers
- There may be changes to the screening and referral process to residential care
 - ACDHS is evaluating and closely monitoring the impact should this occur

Behavioral Health: Early Intervention

- Clarification from OCDEL was released last Friday
- The Alliance is reaching out to families to offer continuation of services via telehealth
 - Weekly calls taking place with all EI providers
 - Timelines have been relaxed subject to "Act of Nature"
 - All services except social work have been approved for tele-provision
- Still unclear how assessments will be completed for new referralsawaiting further guidance
- Number of new referrals has significantly decreased

Behavioral Health: Drug & Alcohol

- Per policy bulletin 20-01 D&A programs who have a grant agreement with DDAP may use grant funds for gambling services including assessments and outpatient counseling via telehealth
- All federal and state privacy and confidentiality requirements apply

Behavioral Health: Use of Telehealth

- State has clarified its guidance
 - Critical to ensure sufficient office and clinic hours for those new and established patients who do not choose or cannot use telehealth or receive services in their homes
 - Mindful of safety of all involved, it is expected there will be a balance of service delivery modalities to meet the needs of individuals being served

Intellectual Disabilities and Autism: Current Activities

- OID Incident Managers are reaching out to all Providers of service this week and will continue to do so weekly. If we haven't connected already, please feel free to reach out to your IM liaison at any time regarding COVID-19 planning and preparation.
- Please continue to use our other teams for contact as you normally would (i.e. Service Authorization, Monitoring & Qualifications, Promising Practices, etc.)

Child welfare critical services: Local plans & next steps

We are moving to align with guidance set out by the Administration for Children and Families.

- Children in kin and foster care placements, tele-conference visitation and monitoring will be permitted but we are requesting prioritizations of visits and check-ins.
- Kinship and foster care providers will receive list of children to prioritize teleconferencing. This prioritization is comprised of but not limted to:
 - All non-verbal children and children under the age of 4
 - Children prescribed psychotropic medication and case management
 - Children with recent psychiatric hospitalizations
 - Recent allegations of abuse and placement due to parent/child conflict

Teleconferencing shall include video conference,

Skype, telephone calls and any other means of video or audio communication designed to effectuate meaningful and effective visitation or conferencing

- We will be asking providers to create plans based on child prioritization
- Plans to include types of contact and frequency per week
- How plan will be updated based on changes

We will provide detailed information and discussion during our call Kinship/foster care call 3/24 at 9:00 am

We will have similar guidelines for non crisis in-home services

In your conversatons please stress the importance of safety considerations and safeguarding the home

Lockbox and Poison Control Information

Once the baby is mobile, it is no longer safe to have medications that are not secured. Prescription, over-the-counter medications, take-home doses of medications used in medication-assisted treatments (like methadone, suboxone, etc.).

If the parents/caregivers have any of these types of medications in the home, it should be strongly encouraged that they obtain a lockbox to store them safely. Many treatment facilities provide these lockboxes for all patients who have take-home privileges; however, some do not. Take the time to discuss this with the parent/caregiver to help them determine what they may need to keep their child safe.

Also, note whether or not the family has information for Poison Control (1-800-222-1222) posted somewhere in the home (or stored in a cell phone). If they do not, provide the information to them.

Please also consider safe storage of firearms and cleaning solutions

Transportation to essential medical and social services

- MATP
 - All non-MATP programs are being placed on hold today as of 4:30pm
 - Traveler's Aide (TA) will reevaluate status during the week of April 13th
 - TA will distribute April's Transportation tickets/passes to current MAT clients on March 24-27 and March 30-31 from 9:00am-3:00pm
- Management of Operations
 - TA is limiting the number of clients in its office, and the amount of time they spend in the office:
 - Only giving replacement cards to clients that have damaged or defective cards (TA is NOT replacing lost or stolen cards.)
 - TA is not signing up new clients at this time
- Office will be fully closed on March 31st at 3:00pm and for approximately for 2 weeks
- Distribution for May's transportation will be evaluated at a later time
- Tickets have been provided to all TA providers for distribution
- TA will reevaluate the May distribution for MAT clients during the week of April 20
- Ride hailing for life sustaining trips are being referred to MATP for ACCESS transportation
- Gas and ticket reimbursements will take place after TA reopens
