

Election Poll Workers Needed

- Allegheny County is recruiting at least another 2,000 poll workers for the November 3rd election. Poll workers will be provided with "infection prevention kits" for election day that includes a face shield, mask, gloves, disinfectant wipes, and hand sanitizer.
- Serve as a Judge, Inspector or Clerk of Election. Election Officers/poll workers earn from \$115 to \$140 for the day. New Election Officers receive paid training. County website link for more information.

Cleaning Services for Providers: Update!

 We began offering cleaning services only to congregate care providers, but haven't had many requests and due to this, any provider that serves clients onsite can request cleaning service

• We will monitor usage and revise our process as/if needed

When to Request

- Providers can request services after someone was present in the building who meets the following criteria:
 - Person has a confirmed positive case of COVID-19
 - Person has been exposed to COVID-19 AND is showing symptoms
- Exception: Homeless services providers can request when someone in the facility has symptoms, even if you don't have a positive test or known exposure
- Providers can also request cleaning services if you are preparing to re-open a facility to clients that has been closed for a period
 - For cleaning prior to re-opening, please request in advance if possible, to help with scheduling

Policy & Legislative Update – Federal, State

- Negotiations on larger 5th Federal stimulus bill are at an impasse while Senate is in recess.
 - Some Senate Republicans are working on a smaller bill that includes \$10 billion in postal service funding, coronavirus liability protections, a \$300/week additional unemployment benefit, another round of Paycheck Protection Program funding, and additional funds for testing and schools.
- Gov. Wolf has moved forward with seeking the additional \$300 in weekly unemployment compensation from President Trump's executive order to get more money to unemployed residents.
 - It is unclear how long the additional funds will last, but the PA Department of Labor believes it will be for as few as 5 weeks.

Policy & Legislative Update – Local

- Bill to ban chokeholds and neck holds was introduced in Allegheny County Council on Tuesday.
 - Because of PA state law, any ban that could be passed would most likely only apply to Allegheny County police and would not apply to municipal police departments.
 - Bill now heads to Public Safety Committee for a Committee recommendation.
 - Pittsburgh City Council passed a ban on police chokeholds in July.

Eviction Order

- On August 7, President Judge Clark issued an order **prohibiting the commencement of new residential landlord tenant actions** where the eviction is based solely on non-payment of rent or on a tenant holding over or exceeding the term of a lease **whether or not the lease includes a waiver of a "notice to quit" provision.**
- The temporary prohibition is **in effect through Aug. 31** while the court remains in emergency status. Read the full order from Aug. 7 <u>here</u>.
- This Order was made in recognition that Governor Wolf's July 9th Order did not affect those residential leases containing a waiver of the "notice to quit" provisions.







Basic stats – The first two weeks (3/16 to 3/29)


- Testing volume increased from a 7-day average of zero to 500 people per day
- Positive testing rate increased from 6% to 9%
- Cases per day rose from 10 to 54, then fell to 20
 - Average cases per day: 34
- Total deaths: 29
 - Average deaths per day: 1.6






Basic stats – The shutdown (3/30 to 6/5)


- **Testing volume** increased from a 7-day average of 526 to 724 people per day

 - Average deaths per day: 3






Basic stats – First reopening (6/6 to 6/30)


- **Testing volume** increased from a 7-day average of 348 to 1,779 people tested per day
- Positive testing rate increased from 1% to a high of 11% on 6/27, then fell to 8%
- Cases per day increased from 2 to 215
 - Average cases per day: 61
- Total deaths: 18
 - Average deaths per day: 1






Basic stats – New restrictions (7/1 to present)

- **Testing volume** has decreased from a 7-day average of 2,540 to 1,281 people tested per day
- **Positive testing rate** have decreased from 10% to 5%
- Cases per day have decreased from 245 to 71
 - Average cases per day: 120
- Total deaths: 86
 - Average deaths per day: 2

First 2 weeks: 515 cases




Other trends

- Gender: More women have tested positive than men throughout the time period. During the reopening period (6/6-6/30), men and women equally tested positive.
- Race: Since 7/1, 29% of all cases were for Black residents, up from 18% during June.
- Ethnicity: 2% of cases were for people who identified as Hispanic. NOTE: we are still missing about 23% of ethnicity information for cases

Cases per 100,000 residents across 4 time periods, by Race


- Cases per 100,00 has been higher for Black residents since the shutdown.

Case rates by ethnicity




Positivity by Race

 currently captured)




Positivity by Ethnicity

 Since the beginning of the pandemic, positivity rates for people identifying as Hispanic have been 10% or above Positivity Rates by Ethnicity across 4 time periods




Geography

Community Need Index (2014-2018)



- Hubs will be places for children to engage in virtual learning and participate in enrichment activities
- Locations will be shared next week
- Priority for FREE programming for children who are:
 - In grades K-5 (with space for middle school too)
 - Low income
 - Engaged with child welfare
 - Engaged in homeless system
 - Are referred by school counselor or social worker
- Initial funding will provide capacity for ~1000 children, demand will be closely monitored

COMING SOON: NEW PROGRAMS FOR YOUTH EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS

- □ In 2019, Allegheny County DHS was awarded a Youth Homelessness Demonstration Program grant from HUD
- Over the past year, DHS and the AC Youth Action Board have convened youth and the partners that serve them incluing community leaders, service providers, educational institutions, foundations and others to create a Coordinated Community Plan to Prevent and End Youth Homelessness.
- □ As part of our CCP, DHS released an RFP earlier this year seeking to fund new programs to address youth homelessness. We are in the process of awarding grants for Host Homes, Mobile Diversion Specialists, and additional Rapid Re-Housing for youth. Stay tuned for more information as those programs begin to ramp up.

In other great youth news: 10 youth moved from homelessness into permanent housing over the past two weeks thanks to the work of our incredible partners in this work.



OMHSAS GUIDANCE ON MASKS, SCREENING & HANDWASHING

- Highlights for face coverings:
 - On July 1, 2020, Pennsylvania Secretary of Health Dr. Rachel Levine signed an Order Requiring Universal Face Coverings
 - As a result of this order, staff who provide services must wear a mask that covers their nose and mouth during the entirety of service provision.
 - Must be a cloth covering or other mask that offers higher degree of protection
 - Applies to all OMHSAS services
 - Plastic face shields are not acceptable alternatives to masks


