# COVID-19 Mobile Testing Schedule

Each Monday, the Allegheny County Health Department provides an updated mobile testing schedule on its <u>Facebook page</u> and <u>Twitter</u>. Testing is ongoing at sites around the County and individuals can <u>register</u> here; some sites allow for walk-ins.

Chuck Keenan joined the call to give an update on the Emergency Rental Assistance program.

- Previous program
  - o Who participated in the previous CARES Rent Relief Program?
    - We had 7,572 people apply and were able to pay 3,623 households. \$14.7M was distributed from PHFA, county CARES funds, and additional county Funds. Each household received \$4,060 on average. Most payments were made in November and December.
    - Applicant Characteristics: Most (75% and 79%, respectively) had received unemployment compensation or public benefits previously. Only 5% had previously received homelessness services.
      - Many came from Pittsburgh, Penn Hills, Wilkinsburg and McKeesport.
         Success rates of applications varied by location.
    - Over 1500 landlords participated.
  - o Lessons Learned
    - Need help from community partners and courts to assist with applications and documentation
    - Have enough staff for rush of applications upon program launch to reduce time
    - New program will allow us to provide direct assistance to tenant if landlord does not want to participate
    - New web portal will allow applicants to check on status and upload documents
- The new program should begin in March. We are awaiting guidance from the US Treasury Dept. on final eligibility rules:
  - o Household income below 80% Area Median Income (AMI)
  - At risk of homelessness or housing instability
  - One of the following due to COVID 19:

- Qualifies for Unemployment Benefits
- Reduction in household income
- Incurred significant costs
- Experienced a financial hardship
- Proof of residency
- Lease or oral lease documentation

- A subset of these recommendations will be finalized and put into an action plan for the County and partners to implement.

All <u>PA State metrics</u> are down from last week in Allegheny County, except for emergency department visits for Covid-like illnesses.

• Hospitalizations and case rates are at pre-Thanksgiving numbers.

## Legislative/Policy Updates

#### State and Local Updates

- Governor Wolf gave his 2021-2022 Budget Address on Wednesday morning, calling for a budget totaling \$37.8 billion, a more than 11% increase from the current year's enacted budget.
   Republican Leadership denounced the budget as a tax hike and a non-starter. The proposed budget includes:
  - Spending increase of \$3.8b covered by raising the personal income tax rate by nearly one and a half percent and by a severance tax on gas drilling.
    - Tax forgiveness credits would negate increases for families making under \$84k a vear.
    - \$1.36b of the increase would go toward increased education funding following the Fair Funding Formula.
  - o Increasing the state's minimum wage to \$12/hour as early as July 2021 with a path to \$15/hour by 2027.
  - The "Back to Work PA" initiative, paid for by the shale tax, focused on job training, career coaching and childcare to promote workforce development.
  - O Justice-related reforms, including cash bail reform, police department accreditation and expansion of medical release eligibility for individuals who are incarcerated.
- Pennie, PA's health insurance exchange, will hold an additional open enrollment period from Feb 15th through March 15th.
  - Pennie encourages those who have found themselves recently uninsured and seeking coverage (and, potentially, financial assistance) to go to <u>pennie.com</u> or to call Pennie customer care at 844-844-8040.

- o Pennie is able to connect eligible applicants to Medicaid or CHIP.
- As a reminder, anyone who experiences a qualifying life event is eligible to enroll in a plan through Pennie *throughout* the year.
- PA Department of Labor & Industry is working to fix technology issues causing delays in getting some Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA) payments to claimants. PUA provides 50 weeks of benefits to individuals who are self-employed or lack sufficient work history to qualify for regular unemployment assistance.
- The Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation Program (PEUC), extended by the December stimulus bill, is now available. PEUC provides additional benefits to individuals whose regular benefits have expired or will expire soon.

- The General Assembly is expected to pass a bill by the end of this week providing \$44 million in additional rental and utility relief funding to Allegheny County.
- PA Secretary of State Kathy Boockvar will resign after revealing her department did not properly
  advertise for the constitutional amendment opening the statute of limitations on child sex abuse
  victims.
  - The General Assembly reached a bipartisan agreement this afternoon to fix this issue by proposing an "emergency constitutional amendment," which will send the original amendment to voters in May as originally planned.
- City Councilmen Burgess and Lavelle call for an "educational emergency" declaration to address COVID-19 and systemic racism in Pittsburgh Public Schools (PPS).
  - o PPS School Board plans to meet with Council members to address the claims.

#### Vaccine Update and Tracking

- According to the <u>state's dashboard</u>, 62,367 partial vaccines and 25,583 full vaccinations have been administered. About 7% of Allegheny County's population has received one shot.
- Vaccine provider locations: PA Dept of Health released this map where people who fall in 1A can receive the vaccine. Allegheny County is doing the following:
  - $\circ$  Monroeville Clinic 65+ and eligible health care workers
  - Partnering with Pitt School of Pharmacy and Pitt Community Engagement Center for clinics in Homewood and the Hill District for adults 65+
  - o DHS is running a closed POD today and tomorrow for 1a populations 500 doses
  - Older adult high rise clinics to begin next week about 1,000 doses per week
  - o 2-1-1 took calls to schedule appointments today but all slots were filled.
