







ACHD Vaccines

- Doses sent to Allegheny County
 - Hospitals, pharmacy, ACHD, FQHC, docs, dialysis
- ~61,000 (~10%) doses receive by ACHD
 - ~ 20% to out of county residents
- Of 1st doses to AC residents (self-identified)
 - Gender: 61% female, 39% male, 0.2% other
 - Age: 76% to 65 year and older
 - Race: 84% W, 9.8% B, 3.1% A, 0.9% O, 2% NR
 - Ethnicity: 1.3% Hispanic/LatinX, 11.8% NR

Vaccine Challenges & Solutions

- Limited Supply
 - New state tracking improving
 - Delay in 2nd doses (<42 days) resolving
 - Large 1A group: greater demand than supply
- Limited local control of distribution
- Registration system
 - 2-1-1 United Way; New system coming soon
- Personnel (staffing with collaborations)
- Vaccine hesitancy
- Equity of distribution

Allegheny County Basic Needs COVID-19 Relief Fund

- Eligibility: Families with children under 18 with need due to impact of COVID (loss of job/hours, illness, caregiving, etc.)
- One-time \$700 grant that can be used for almost any need EXCEPT rental assistance (rental relief coming soon)

Gov Wolf's Order Lifting Some Restrictions

- Effective Sunday, April 4, Gov Wolf announced the lifting of some targeted restrictions on restaurants, some businesses, and increasing gathering limits:
 - Restaurants may resume bar service; alcohol service will be allowed without the purchase of food; the curfew for removing alcoholic drinks from tables will be lifted; and indoor dining capacity will be raised to 75% for those restaurants that are currently self-certified or are willing to undergo the <u>self-certification process</u>.
 - Restaurants that do not self-certify may raise capacity to 50%. Outdoor dining, curbside pick-up and takeout are still encouraged.
 - Requirements such as mask-wearing, and social distancing, including 6 feet between diners, also still apply.
 - Capacity for other businesses also will be increased, including moving personal services facilities, gyms and entertainment facilities (casinos, theatres, malls) to 75 percent occupancy.
 - Maximum occupancy limits for indoor events to allow for 25% of maximum occupancy, regardless of venue size, and maximum occupancy limits for outdoor events to allow for 50% of maximum occupancy, regardless of venue size. Maximum occupancy is permitted only if attendees and workers are able to comply with the 6-foot physical distancing requirement.

Policy & Legislative Update - Federal

Accessing federal stimulus payments created by the American Rescue Plan

- Individuals with an adjusted gross income less than \$75,000 are eligible for \$1,400 payments and \$1,400 for each dependent
 - Payment reduced for individuals with incomes between \$75,001 and 80,000
- IRS began issuing payments on Monday, March 15th
- The IRS will use available information to determine eligibility and issue the third payment to eligible people who:
 - 1) Filed a 2020 tax return
 - 2) Filed a 2019 tax return if the 2020 return has not been submitted or processed yet
 - 3) Did not file a 2020 or 2019 tax return, but registered for the first Economic Impact Payment using the special Non-Filers portal last year
 - 4) Are federal benefit recipients as of December 31, 2020, who do not usually file a tax return and received Social Security, Supplemental Security Income (SSI) or Veteran benefits

Policy & Legislative Update - State

- The recently enacted American Rescue Plan will dramatically increase access to comprehensive health insurance coverage across PA by:
 - Increasing the subsidies available on Pennie (open enrollment through May 15th) and making more individuals eligible:
 - eliminates the 400 percent federal poverty limit ceiling on subsidy eligibility
 - increases subsidies available to those already eligible
 - extends subsidies to middle-income households previously ineligible
 - Providing the maximum available Affordable Care Act premium subsidies and reduced cost-sharing for anyone who receives, or are eligible to receive, unemployment compensation at any point throughout this year.
 - Subsidizing 100 percent of COBRA premiums for six months for individuals who lost their employer-sponsored coverage due to layoffs or reduced hours.

Policy & Legislative Update - State


- Gov Wolf nominated Suzanne Estrella to lead the State's Office Victim
 Advocate (OVA), filling the vacancy left by Jennifer Storm who resigned in
 January. The PA Senate will need to confirm the nomination.
 - OVA implements post-sentencing rights and services for victims of crimes.
- This week, Committees in both houses of the PA General Assembly advanced bills to allow an emergency referendum for an amendment to the PA Constitution that would open a two-year window on the statute of limitations to pursue claims of sex abuse.
 - Due to an oversight, the PA Department of State did not properly advertise the proposed amendment passed by the General Assembly and, without the above emergency legislation, the referendum would have been delayed by two more years.
 - If the bills pass by a 2/3rds majority in both houses, the amendment will appear on the ballot statewide for the May Primary.



 - 8% of people are fully vaccinated and 20% have at least one shot







COVID-19 Vaccine Dashboard

Number of People Vaccinated, by Ra




Through 3/10/2021, of all people with at least one shot:

- 62% are females
- 49% are people 65+
- 7% were Black, 87% were White and 6% were another identified race.
 - NOTE: Only out of those with a documented race. 19% of people receiving a vaccine had an 'unknown' race
- Of those with ethnicity data, only 387 have identified as Hispanic (0.3% of records)
 - NOTE: 47% of records are missing ethnicity



Vaccinations by Age Group


- Almost half of residents 65+ have received at least one shot

Percent of total population by sex that have received at least one shot






Vaccinations by Race and Ethnicity

- *Almost 20% of records do not have race information and half are missing ethnicity data.





The positivity rate has remained steady since mid-January, mostly has a result of the number of people being tested decreasing. On March 12^{th} , there was a positivity rate of 16% (135 cases out of 828 tests)



The number of cases per tests has remained relatively steady since late January/early February.

Metric #2: Number of People Tested Per New Case

METRIC DEFINITION: The count of people tested for each case over the last 7 days is greater than or equal to 50.

Testing should be responsive to the number of cases. As case counts increase, so should testing. As case counts decrease, so also should testing.



Similar to a low case count, a low case rate indicates fewer people are infected and have the ability to spread covid-19 to others.






