






Policy & Legislative Update - Federal and State

- Closely monitoring Congressional action on the federal covid relief package, "American Rescue Plan"
 - Expect enactment next week with significant human services related investments and supports for individuals
 - Will provide a summary of the final legislation
- Pennie, PA's health insurance exchange, is holding an additional open enrollment period through May 15
 - Pennie connects eligible applicants to Medicaid or CHIP.
 - Anyone who experiences a qualifying life event is eligible to enroll anytime during the year.

Policy & Legislative Update - State

- Gov. Wolf revised maximum occupancy limits for indoor and outdoor events and removed the out-of-state travel restriction
 - Indoor events: allows for 15% of maximum occupancy, regardless of venue size, only if attendees and workers can comply with the 6-foot physical distancing requirement.
 - Outdoor events: allows for 20% of maximum occupancy, regardless of venue size, only if attendees and workers can comply with the 6-foot physical distancing requirement.
 - This order does not change requirements for restaurants and bars.
 - Continued enforcement of core public health measures such as face covering (mask-wearing), social distancing, and hand hygiene.


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The NEW Emergency Rental Assistance Program

- Eligibility Criteria
 - Household income below 80% Area Median Income (AMI)
 - At risk of homelessness or housing instability
 - One of the following due to COVID 19
 - Qualifies for unemployment benefits
 - Reduction in household income
 - Incurred significant costs
 - Experienced a financial hardship
 - Lease or oral lease documentation


FAMILY PRESERVATION - Strategic Initiative Overview

FAMILY PRESERVATION - What is CYF's Strategic Initiative to Strengthen CYF's Prevention Service Program?

• When it comes to prevention: Allegheny County Office of Children, Youth and Family's seeks to double down efforts. To address concerns that may place children at risk of harm and could potentially lead to a child's placement in foster care, CYF will make every effort to engage families in prevention services. CYF seeks to support families so that children are safe and able to thrive in stable, nurturing homes and communities.



FAMILY PRESERVATION - Our commitment to families: make every effort to engage families in prevention services

What will this look like in practice? To us, it will mean:

- Offering the **right services to families based on assessed needs** and ensuring those services are delivered in a manner **consistent with families' cultural, geographic and linguistic needs**; and
- **Investing in supports for providers** to allow quality, sustainable implementation of prevention programs that are known to make a difference for families.



FAMILY PRESERVATION - How will we get there? Key Planned Actions

We want to **re-build our prevention services** array (currently referred to as "in-home") to enhance our ability to **meet families' needs** with programmatic services and targeted supports that are **known to make a difference.**

To advance this mission, we plan to rebuild our in-home service array by:

- 1. Releasing this Spring an RFP to **procure a new clinical intervention** that can be delivered in the home for families who qualify.
- 2. Re-procuring concrete goods and basic needs services later this year for families in CYF's family preservation system
- 3. Effective FY 2023 taking down the service strings currently associated with the traditional in-home program.

 - About 16% of Allegheny County's population has received at least one shot






COVID-19 Vaccine Dashboard



Allegheny County

Through 3/3/2021:

- 52% of all vaccines have been administered to females
- 40% of all vaccines have been delivered to people 65+
- Black individuals have received 7% of all vaccines, White individuals 69%.
 - NOTE: 18% of people receiving a vaccine had an 'unknown' race
- 1% of vaccines have been administered to people identifying as Hispanic.
 - NOTE: 41% of records are missing ethnicity






The people tested per case has been increasing since early January. Both testing and cases have fallen throughout January and February.




Cases rose in the last week. There were 1,747 cases the week of 2/20.




The case rate per 100,000 residents fell this last week, but has been steady over the last few days.




The 3-day average of total net hospitalizations has fallen since 12/17 (859). It was 164 on 3/2.




ICU bed usage has fallen since 1/7. On 3/2, the ICU bed usage was 85%.



Deaths have fallen since the end of December.



The average weekly positivity rate been decreasing since early December, but did increase over the last week. On February 26th, there was a **17% positivity rate** (170 cases out of 1,006 tests).



NOTE: The spikes on the graph are from Thanksgiving and Christmas Day, when there were much fewer tests taken.
